Answer:

The name of Didsbury came from the Saxon "Dyddi's burg", who was a man known by the name Dyddi whose manor it was. Didsbury is the site of St James Church whose origin is thought to be before Saxon times. It was here in the 14th century that victims of the Black Death were buried. Several rebuilds and five centuries later and the church is still standing and in use today. Here you will also find the Old Parsonage, known as Fletcher Moss, whose ghost is still claimed to walk its floors today!

There's also lots of other interesting places to see in Stockport:-

- <u>Hat Museum</u> the UK's first and only museum dedicated to the exciting world of hats and hat making. Situated within Wellington Mill the site has been transformed into a major new attraction, providing hands on facilitated sessions and hatting demonstrations.
- Stockport Air Raid Caves Come and experience life as it was during a 'black out' in war torn Britain.
- <u>Staircase House</u> An exciting attraction for all the family. Come and listen, smell and touch, peel back the bedclothes of the four poster bed, sit by the 18th Century dining table and try your hand at quill pen writing.
- <u>Stockport Story</u> The Museum houses a fascinating collection stretching back 10,000 years and it's all FREE to explore! Delve into Stockport's rich history and time travel from the past to the present day. With five galleries to visit,
